26/1118 Any questions on ongoing drainage matters	<i>September Flooding Summary Report</i> Flood-related Work Across the Village, Ongoing Activities:-	

(see report submitted – included here for reference)	Drains: some of the drain catchpots across the village were cleared by OCC in August. We can access information on when individual drains were last cleared, though this takes some time to be updated. We will have a better view of which drains need attention when the Flood Group reviews the situation and any drains which need further work doing will be reported through fixmystreet. We would encourage homeowners to do the same for any drains near their properties which they feel need to be cleared. Moor Lane Ditch: the Flood Group (many thanks to the team!) have been removing vegetation from this central channel and we will continue to do so into the Autumn. We will also review the benefit of silt removal, as in some locations this is waist high. Leigh Travers at SODC has performed a 'levels' assessment of the ditch so we will also discuss the best way forward with him. 'Flood' and 'Flood, Road Ahead Closed' Hazard Signs: these have now been received from OCC for use on Brook Lane and if needed, other parts of the village. OCC and villagers will be kept informed of decisions made in this regard. Village Flood 'Hotspots': we have previously highlighted a couple of locations which need OCC support for flood-related works. There is no progress reported with either of these but we will continue to follow up for works on Brook Lane drains and at the trash screen opposite the old Horse & Harrow pub. A reminder that a stock of sandbags are held by the Parish Council and available to villagers in need. A very helpful website for assessing home flood resilience is to be found at floodmary.com and Mary Long-Dhonau OBE, who set up the site and is one of the UK's leading flood resilience experts, is hosting a free to attend webinar on Tuesday 15th September at 5pm. Villagers can sign up to the webinar by emailing: hello@floodforum.org.uk. It was proposed DT, seconded AW, that the decision to approve the removal of silt from the Moor Lane ditch up to a max budget of £750, under supervision of RW was approved with approval from DT/AW/JF and ML abstained. Community Speedwatch Group – due to the extreme weather this summer the group took a break from regular sessions. These have now resumed. Telraam vehicle data recorder – this remains in position on Main Street and continues to record and transmit traffic data to OCC. Example data from 4th Sept 2026: Cars – 3650 Larger vehicles – 567 2-wheeled vehicles – 72 Pedestrians – 12 Night time – 364 There has been no information from the Telraam Team as to how long the device will stay in place or for what purpose the data will be used. Correspondence - An email has been sent in response to John Beale's (OCC Highways) communication regarding the PCs concerns over traffic and road safety in West Hagbourne parish. No reply has been received. Following the receipt of a letter from a resident regarding excessive speeding on Main Street, a meeting has taken place which resulted in the matter being passed on to OCC Highways. As a result, an additional 20mph speed limit sign will be sited on the verge prior to the entrance to Briar House. Vegetation clearance - this will be necessary to ensure that signage

	remains visible in the areas around the new village entrance gates. To be addressed in a review of the grass cutting contract (see Community Matters). Road Traffic Accidents - there is evidence of two incidences where vehicles have left the road. The planted trough, post reflector and a section of chain situated at the pond were damaged/dislodged during the night of 9th August. Also, damage to the field hedge and chevron road sign at the northern end of Brook Lane has occurred and been reported on FMS. Damaged weight limit signage, Coscote corner – although in East Hagbourne parish, the signage is relevant to West Hagbourne and has been reported previously on FMS with no action taken. This has been reported again. Damaged pavement areas, Main Street - have been reported repeatedly to OCC by residents, councillors and more recently by the village 'super user' without success. The OCC Highways Engagement team have now been contacted directly, resulting in immediate action being taken to repair two areas with a third, larger area, being scheduled into the programme of works. In addition, a statutory inspection of the village roads and pavements is due to take place this month. Kids Planet signage - has been removed from the roundabout on the A417. PROW - Moor Lane to Upton footpath – the 2 wooden bridges (first reported in May 2025) have still not been repaired by OCC Countryside Access team despite repeated attempts. Clerk to now write to Jonny Hope – Smith for assistance with this pressing matter. Councillor's held a meeting in Moor Lane to discuss the Quite Lane proposal. Awaiting more information from Dan McCrory - OCC Technical Lead, Place Shaping – Central Economy and Place Directorate before a meeting with OCC official's will be arranged.	Clerk

Consultation on Councils' second Joint Local Plan launched

A consultation has launched this week on the South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils' second Joint Local Plan.

A local plan sets out how development will be planned and delivered over time to meet the current and future needs of people living and working in a particular area. It guides where development should go (and where it shouldn't) including new housing and employment, as well as identifying the

supporting infrastructure needed.

The two councils are working on a joint plan that covers both districts.

This stage of the process, known as a 'scoping consultation' is an initial step to get an idea of what communities, businesses and the planning industry think the plan should include and how the councils should approach future engagement.

This consultation does not include any proposed policies or strategies for the plan as the councils are at such an early stage in the plan making process.

Why two plans?

New government regulations mean that at the same time as working towards adopting the first Joint Local Plan, the councils are required to start preparing the next plan for the area, which would run to 2045. This is known as 'twin-tracking'.

This needs to be in line with the government's new requirements for preparing, examining and adopting plans in 30 months, which the councils must start by 31 October 2026.

The councils' first Joint Local Plan is currently being examined by government-appointed inspectors. The plan was submitted to the Secretary of State for independent examination in December 2024. The first stage of inspector-led hearing sessions took place in June 2025, the second stage in July 2026, and a further third stage is expected this autumn.

Joint statement from South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils on Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) Announcement

The government has announced it will review its local government reorganisation (LGR) decisions across England.

This has implications about the future of councils in Oxfordshire and West Berkshire.

In a joint statement, the leaders of the South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Council expressed their disbelief and disappointment at the latest government announcement:

Councillor Maggie Filipova-Rivers, Leader of South Oxfordshire District Council:

"We're deeply disappointed to have received this information at such short notice. All along, our councils have

all done what government had asked of us in the preparation for local government reorganisation. Every pound and every officer hour spent responding to a process that is subsequently paused, is a resource that could have been spent on housing, social care, roads, planning and other frontline services. The uncertainty this has caused is a further erosion of our trust in government.

“We will now do our utmost to understand the way forward for our districts.”

Councillor Bethia Thomas, Leader of Vale of White Horse District Council:

“This unexpected announcement [yesterday] has come as a shock to us all at Vale and completely disregards the huge amount of time, money and effort we have put in so far to follow what has been asked of us.

“We will be seeking further clarity from the government on how this will affect the Local Government Reorganisation timeline in our area. We hope the government will provide the detail required urgently given the impact this announcement may have for us.

“In the face of such confusion created in Westminster, our priority remains to secure the best possible future outcome for our communities.”

New signage to boost walking, cycling and connectivity across Didcot

New information and visitor signage is being installed across Didcot to improve awareness on walking and cycling routes to connect communities across the town.

The new signs aim to help residents and visitors find their way around Didcot more easily, as well as encourage sustainable travel and strengthen connections between neighbourhoods, facilities and open spaces.

A total of forty-nine wayfinding signs will be installed, with the first thirty going in from this week, 7 to 22 September. The signs will be placed across the town including locations across Ladygrove, Great Western Park, and the Jubilee roundabout.

Three types of signage will be installed:

- Totems (tall, freestanding structures with maps of town and local areas)
- Fingerposts (traditional directional signposts)
- Waymarkers (small directional markers placed along public paths)

The new signs will all be made from sustainable and recycled materials and where possible, any signage being replaced will be recycled.

The Didcot Garden Town team have been working with Oxfordshire County Council's highways department and Great Western Railway to identify the best locations and the most suitable signage before installation.

The new wayfinding project for Didcot has been funded by £50,000 CIL (developer contributions) from Oxfordshire County Council and government funding allocated to the Didcot Garden Town

programme.

The idea for the signage came from the South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils Didcot Garden Town programme's "Wayfinding Strategy", which was set up to create a coordinated approach to signage, mapping and navigation across the town.

The councils are working alongside local housing developers and Milton Park to continue the signage as areas develop. Oxfordshire County Council will use the designs from these signs on the routes that will be part of the HIF1 improvements so that there is a lasting legacy to project across the area.

Further notes:

- The Didcot Garden Town Wayfinding Strategy was adopted by South Oxfordshire District Council and Vale of White Horse District Council in 2024.
- The study area covers the Didcot Garden Town boundary, including the town centre, existing neighbourhoods and future growth areas.
- The strategy supports the wider Didcot Garden Town vision and Delivery Plan

Free Electric Blanket Checks – Book Early for Winter Safety

Key Details

- Oxfordshire County Council is once again offering free electric blanket safety checks to help residents stay safe and warm this winter.
- Last year, more than a third of blankets tested failed safety checks, highlighting the importance of regular testing. Faulty electric blankets can present a risk of fire or injury.
- Testing sessions will be held across Oxfordshire during September and October, including nearby locations in Didcot on the 5th October
- Appointments are expected to be popular and should be booked in advance.

What Parishes Can Do

- **Share the opportunity with residents, particularly older people and vulnerable households who may rely on electric blankets during the winter.**
- **Encourage residents to have blankets tested even if they appear to be in good condition.**

Temporary Restrictions on Fridge & Freezer Disposal

Key Details

- A national shortage of specialist facilities for recycling fridges and freezers has led Oxfordshire County Council to introduce temporary restrictions at Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRCs).
- Residents can now only see fridge and freezer booking availability up to one week in advance rather than the usual two weeks.
- Households are limited to one fridge or freezer booking every three months, although up to two appliances can be taken per booking.
- OCC reports that national treatment capacity has fallen by around one third, creating a significant backlog across the country.
- Residents are encouraged to use retailer take back schemes, or to sell or donate working appliances where possible.

What Parishes Can Do

- **Share the temporary restrictions with residents who may be planning to dispose of fridges or freezers.**
- **Encourage residents to book early and check availability before travelling to an HWRC.**
- **Promote retailer take back services and reuse options for working appliances.**
- **Remind residents that proof of Oxfordshire residency is required when attending an HWRC and that visitors from outside the county are charged £15.**

Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) – Government Review Announced

Key Details

- The government has announced it will review its Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) decisions across England following legal advice, including the previously announced proposals affecting Oxfordshire and West Berkshire.
- As a result, the government's earlier “minded to” decision for Oxfordshire has been paused while the underlying evidence and advice are reviewed.
- OCC has stated that significant preparation work has already been undertaken for LGR and is now seeking further clarification from government on the implications for the programme.
- Questions remain about the future timetable, including how this may affect local elections scheduled for May and the overall implementation timeline.

What Parishes Can Do

- **Keep residents informed that no final decision has yet been made on future council structures in Oxfordshire.**
- **Continue to engage with existing county and district councils as normal, as current governance arrangements remain unchanged.**
- **Monitor future updates from government and Oxfordshire County Council, as further announcements are expected on timescales, elections and implementation.**

Botley Road Reopening – Expected This Month

Key Details

- Network Rail and its contractors are currently working towards reopening Botley Road to traffic on 20 September 2026, following more than three years of closure associated with the Oxford Station expansion project. The road has been closed since April 2023 and has experienced several delayed reopening dates during that period.
- The most recent delay was announced in July after gas leaks were discovered during excavation works. Gas network operator SGN has since confirmed its work was completed on 3 August.

What Parishes Can Do

- **Continue to advise residents that the current target date for reopening is 20 September 2026, whilst recognising that previous reopening dates have been postponed.**
- **Share updates with residents who regularly travel to Oxford, particularly commuters and those accessing the city centre and rail station.**
- **Monitor Network Rail announcements for confirmation that the reopening date remains on track as September progresses.**

- **Be aware that traffic patterns around Oxford may continue to evolve even after the road reopens as wider station improvement works continue.**

REMINDER: Councillor Priority Fund – Supporting Local Projects – DEADLINE NOVEMBER 2026

The Councillor Priority Fund is still open, offering each Oxfordshire County Councillor £10,000 to support community projects within their division. This funding is designed to help deliver local priorities and strengthen community initiatives.

Parish councils, community groups, and local organisations are encouraged to apply for funding to support projects that benefit residents. Examples might include:

- Improvements to community facilities
- Local environmental initiatives
- Activities that promote wellbeing or inclusion
- Smaller-scale projects are especially encouraged, as the fund is modest and intended to support a wide range of communities across Oxfordshire

Key Details:

- Applications must be submitted by 30 November 2026
- Grants are typically paid within 28 days of approval
- Applicants must register for an account to apply and track progress
- Monitoring and reporting are required for successful projects

To ensure your project meets the funding criteria, please read the guidance document before applying.

What Parishes Can Do

- **Identify local projects that could benefit from modest funding**
- **Collaborate with community groups to develop proposals**
- **Submit applications early to allow time for review and payment**

Keep records and be prepared to report on outcomes

Renewable Energy Consultation – Community Funding Opportunity

Key Details

- Oxfordshire County Council has launched a consultation on a new policy for Community Benefit Contributions (CBC) and Community Shared Ownership (CSO) linked to renewable energy projects.
- The policy aims to ensure local communities directly benefit from developments such as solar farms and battery storage.
- For host communities, this could mean annual, index-linked payments for 20 to 40 years into a locally controlled fund.
- For projects under 10MW, 100% of funding would stay within the local community.
- Parish and community groups would help decide how funds are spent through a Community Action Plan.
- There are already 25+ renewable projects in the Oxfordshire pipeline, potentially generating over £20 million in community benefit funding by 2030

What Parishes Can Do

- Respond to the consultation and encourage residents to do the same:
- Consider how your parish could use long-term funding (e.g. facilities, climate projects, transport, community services).
- Engage early if renewable schemes are proposed locally to ensure your parish secures its share of funding.
- Begin thinking about local priorities that could form the basis of a future Community Action Plan.

Road Safety – Oxfordshire Leads Regional Reduction in Casualties

Key Details

- New data shows Oxfordshire is leading the region in reducing road casualties, with a downward trend in serious injuries and fatalities.
- The figures reflect the impact of a range of measures including 20mph schemes, road safety improvements and targeted interventions.
- Reductions have been seen across different road users, including drivers, cyclists and pedestrians.
- The progress aligns with the council's wider aim to improve road safety and create safer, more liveable communities.

What Parishes Can Do

- Share the positive trend locally to build support for road safety initiatives such as 20mph limits.
- Encourage residents to continue reporting safety concerns or hazardous locations.
- Support local measures that improve safety, including speed awareness, signage and community campaigns.

- Feed in local concerns about speeding or dangerous junctions to inform future improvements

REMINDER - Water Safety – Summer Safety Message

- Oxfordshire Fire and Rescue Service is urging residents to stay safe around open water, particularly during warm weather.
- Open water (rivers, lakes, quarries) can be extremely dangerous, with risks including cold water shock, strong currents and hidden hazards.
- Several serious incidents and deaths have already been reported nationally and locally during recent hot weather.
- Young people are particularly at risk, especially during the summer holidays.
If someone is in trouble in the water, remember “Phone, Float, Throw”
 - Phone 999
 - Encourage them to float on their back
 - Throw something to help them stay afloat
